Stages of Development of The Uzbek Language

In particular, research was conducted on Soviet-era language policy, script reforms, and terminological changes. In this regard, the works of E.D. Polivanov and A.K. Borovkov are of great importance. They studied the phonetic system, dialects, and literary norms of the Uzbek language.

During the period of independence, the status of the Uzbek language as the state language, national language policy, and modern stages of development began to be studied on the basis of new scientific approaches. N. Mahmudov, B. Yo'ldoshev, and other contemporary linguists are conducting research on current trends in the development of the Uzbek language, its role in the process of globalization, and issues of language culture.

It was observed that the increase in terms related to science, culture, and religion expanded the stylistic possibilities of the language during this period.

3. The period of the Old Uzbek literary language

The 14th–19th centuries are considered the period of the Old Uzbek literary language. This stage is closely connected with the works of Alisher Navoi. Through his works, Navoi proved

that the Turkic language was a rich and fully developed literary language. During this period, the vocabulary of the Uzbek language expanded significantly. The analysis showed that although Arabic and Persian had a strong influence on the Old Uzbek language, national linguistic elements retained their leading position. This contributed to the formation of Uzbek as an independent literary language.

4. The modern Uzbek literary language

Beginning in the 20th century, a new stage in the development of the Uzbek language started. Orthographic rules and grammatical norms of the language were established. During the years of independence, the granting of state language status to Uzbek became an important factor in its development. Today, the Uzbek language is widely used in science, education, and mass media.

During the years of independence, the status of Uzbek as the state language was strengthened. The transition to the Latin script was regarded as one of the important stages in the development of the language. At present, it has been observed that the vocabulary of the language is becoming increasingly enriched under the influence of the Internet and mass communication media.

DISCUSSION

The stages of development of the Uzbek language are closely connected with the historical development of the Uzbek people. Each period gave rise to new linguistic features. In particular, during the period of Alisher Navoi, the Uzbek literary language reached a high stage of development. While the influence of Russian on the language intensified during the Soviet period, national language policy developed after independence.

The study once again confirmed that the Old Turkic language was the initial foundation of the Uzbek language. The preservation of many linguistic units found in the Orkhon-Yenisei inscriptions in modern Uzbek demonstrates the historical continuity of the language. This fact scientifically supports the idea that Turkic languages share a common root. At the same time, it was determined that the gradual separation of Uzbek from other Turkic languages and its formation as an independent language were the result of a long historical process.

During the discussion, the role of the Middle Turkic period in the development of the Uzbek literary language was especially

emphasized. During this period, the development of science, culture, and religious thought enriched the vocabulary of the language. Although the borrowed lexical layer from Arabic and Persian expanded the scientific and literary possibilities of the language, in some cases it also led to the emergence of complex stylistic forms. Nevertheless, the main grammatical system of the Turkic language was preserved.

The period of Alisher Navoi was assessed as a turning point in the development of the Uzbek language. In his works, Navoi was able to demonstrate the aesthetic and literary potential of the Turkic language at a high level. In particular, his work *Muhokamat ul-lug'atayn* is significant because it scientifically and artistically substantiated that the Turkic language was not inferior to Persian. This played an important role in the formation of the Uzbek literary language as an independent and fully developed language.

During the Soviet period, the development of the Uzbek language appeared as a complex process. On the one hand, the grammatical norms of the language were systematized, literacy increased, and the scientific style developed. On the other hand, as a result of the strong influence of Russian, many foreign terms entered the language. Although this process expanded the vocabulary of the Uzbek language, it also caused some national linguistic elements to fall out of use.

During the period of independence, the granting of state language status to Uzbek significantly increased its social prestige. Within the framework of state policy, important reforms were carried out to develop the language, improve spelling rules, and transition to the Latin script. In addition, globalization and the development of information technologies are having a significant impact on modern Uzbek. New terms and expressions are entering the language through the Internet, social networks, and mass communication media. Although this indicates that the language is adapting to modern needs, in some cases it leads to violations of literary language norms. Therefore, preserving language culture, strengthening national language norms, and regulating new terms on a scientific basis are among the most important tasks.

As a result of the discussion, it was determined that the development of the Uzbek language is a continuous and

complex historical process. Political systems, cultural relations, religious views, and the development of science have served as important factors in the development of the language. Therefore, the in-depth study of the Uzbek language is of great scientific importance not only for linguistics but also for history, cultural studies, and literary studies.

Today, the process of globalization is causing new terms to enter the Uzbek language. This enriches the lexical layer of the language while also creating certain problems. For this reason, preserving and developing language norms remains an urgent task.
